## President's Message: Lessons in Beautification

It is a privilege to serve as your BCSEM President for 2016. As many of you know, I served previously as President in 1999 & 2000. Thanks for your vote of confidence and thanks to the Board that will serve with me. Our gratitude to Jim Keehn for serving so ably as our President these past two years.

Having served continuously on the Grosse Pointe Park Beautification Commission since 1985, the Board of BCSEM since 1995 and Keep Michigan Beautiful, Inc. since 1999; I have learned some lessons regarding beautification that are worth sharing with you.

1. Beautification enhances the quality of life in a community. It gives people a sense of community pride and identity and makes them feel welcome where they live. Everyone should feel a sense of responsibility for the beauty of their community starting with where they live and extending beyond their personal property.

2. Beautification projects and programs do not need to cost a fortune. Volunteers and donors are the backbone of many beautification projects. It is important to recognize

and honor beautification projects and programs. If you don't, people may feel their efforts aren't worthwhile.

3. Beautification is contagious. Your project may inspire someone else to do a project. Let's not be responsible for setting a bad example for others.

4. Don't take beautification for granted. Weeds and litter accumulate faster than flowers. Beautification requires an organized effort and you don't need to be a master gardener to be involved. Success can be achieved by volunteers and professionals working hand in hand.

5. Beautification is more than planting trees and flowers. It includes the clean-up of littered or industrial sites, the recycling of materials and the preservation of historic sites.

6. Beautification can create a positive economic climate in a community. It is a magnet for business and tourism. When did you ever want to visit a dump? Beautification improves the market value of property.

7. Beautification promotes healthier communities. When litter and hazardous waste are removed, you reduce the threat of disease and injury.

8. Beautification promotes safer communities. Criminals often occupy blighted buildings and hide behind overgrown landscapes.

9. Beautification promotes mental health in communities. Order and beauty has a calming effect on people. Beauty soothes the soul and inspires the spirit.

10. Beautification is good for the earth. It promotes stewardship of our resources and helps us leave a better place for future generations. It enables us to be an advocate for environmental awareness.

In general, beautification creates cleaner, greener, healthier, happier and safer communities. As we are about to enter another growing season, ask what can I do to make my home and community a more

Beautiful place to live? What projects can I get involved with that will enhance the quality of life in my community? How can I help honor those who volunteer their time for such projects?

Maybe you can nominate someone for the BCSEM Individual Service Award or for a Keep Michigan Beautiful Award? April and May have been designated as "Clean-up Days" in the State of Michigan. Can you spearhead a project in your local community or join an ongoing project? What lessons have you learned in your local beautification groups? Share with us. We would love to hear from you.
